Lisa Doucett provided the following: "Here is the photo from the 1910 reunion. The barn is highly decorated with buntings, etc, I do not have an explanation, though the reunions were often held in conjunction with berry picking, so it could have been the fourth of July."

After almost 100 years the Claflin Board has decided to *return to the barn*. In an effort to cut costs while maintaining a focus on the historical value of our reunions, the Topsfield barn has been selected as this year's reunion site. George Claflin has worked tirelessly with reunion committee members, Frances Wentworth and Heather Clayton, to bring the Claflin Cousins together with games and music. The Claflin Family Archive is getting closer to a reality. Negotiations continue for locating the archive at the Hopkinton Historical Society Museum at Hayden Rowe in Hopkinton, MA. The building is a former two-room schoolhouse where the society has been located since 1991. The building is undergoing major renovation at this time. A new climate-controlled basement is the area in which the archives will come to stay. This will allow preservation of family memorabilia for future generations of Claflins to view and research.

Financial Update by President, Bill Claflin

Since the Association meeting in Lowell, MA last July 26, our financial resources, invested in 6 Fidelity Mutual Funds, have declined from a high of \$104,000; on May 31, 2008, to below \$72,000 due to the decline in the financial markets.

In compliance with the Association bylaws, we finance our yearly activities by drawing upon these accounts to an extent that does not exceed 5% of their overall value, averaged over 3 years.

Given the extraordinary decline in our investments over the last six months, we have been considering whether or not we would live with the averages of the past 3 years or figure our draw as a % of just the current, lesser balance. This step would reduce our draw by about \$1,000 to about \$3,750.

Our income consists of the draw described above, the sale of reprints

of the Wight Genealogy of the Claflin Family and the cookbook, and, of course, the generous donations of our members. This income supports:

- 1. The annual reunion, including:
- ⇒ printing expenses
- ⇒ mailing expenses
- facilities rental
- ⇒ luncheon
- ⇒ entertainment
- 2. The newsletter
- 3. Scholarship awards

How shall we replace the expected reduction in investment, or what shall we give up in expenditures?

We have voted to have a box for luncheon donations at the registration table (as was done in some former years) and continue to budget carefully and thoughtfully.

We consider two newsletters a

year, plus the reunion registration mailing as essential communication with Family members. At reunions we support lunch and worthwhile entertainment necessary to entice Family members to take the time out of their busy schedules to attend this yearly event. We will provide this in Topsfield this July.

This discussion will be continued at our April Board meeting, at which time we will be considering and adopting a budget for the 2010 fiscal year. To learn about this barn is to step back into American history. It was built about 1710 and originally stood at 129 Washington Street, about a mile from its present site. It was built by the Goulds, one of the founding familes of Topsfield. Zac- 297 year old white oak timbers cheus Gould came from England about 1639 and took an active role in creating the town, then known as New Meadows, and was one of its leading citizens. The barn's owner during the Revolutionary War was Joseph Gould, Zaccheus's greatgrandson. Joseph was a farmer who, on December 5, 1774 was

Topsfield Gould Barn was built about 1710 by the Zaccheus Gould. It is now insulated with a capacity of 99. It has wheelchair accessible restrooms and a kitchen is available. There are fields surrounding the barn that allow for cookouts and sports.

elected Captain by the citizens of Topsfield of one of the two Militia Companies. It is recorded that Captain Gould was one of those who, on April 19, 1775, left his plow in midfurrow and galloped off to Lexington and Concord to help drive the Redcoats back to Boston. It is his barn that has been restored. The clearly show the hand tool marks left by their colonial craftsman. Think of it: this barn was 22 years old when George Washington was born! The barn was given to the Society in 1982 by Dr. and Mrs. Michael Schiff and carefully dismantled prior to its timbers being stored for future preservation and

reconstruction. The key figure in the restoration was the President of the Society, Mr. Norman Isler of Topsfield. Many volunteers were used in the restoration process. Local trees furnished much of the lumber for the reconstruction. Much effort was made to reconstruct the Barn as authentically as possible. Parson Capen had a barn, now long gone, which was contemporary with the Gould Barn. The Gould Barn now reerected on the Capen property will help visitors understand and appreciate more completely life in Colonial Topsfield.

John Pillis, Claflin board member, has been working with members of the Hopkinton Historical Society to establish a repository for many of the Claflin memorabilia. He has scanned a sketchbook of Jenny Claflin, daughter of Sumner. Her art sketchbook consists of vivid sketches of her family, friends and buildings in Goffstown, NH 100 years ago. The archive will be able to store scrapbooks, photographs, etc. of the Claflin family and of their reunions.

Currently a committee consisting of myself, Bill Claflin, Marcia Wardwell, Deborah Deptula and John Cowern will meet to set up the criteria for the archive. A letter has been sent to Russell Greve, the curator, to meet with the Hopkinton Historical Society board. Your board will meet in Hopkinton for the quarterly meeting on April 25, where they will be able to inspect the Hopkinton Historical Society Museum and determine what kind of materials

(bookcases, file cabinets, etc) will be needed to store items there. The final step will be the agreement between the Claflin Board and the Hopkinton Historical Society Board on the archives.

There is still much to be done but the archive project is alive and well.
